Note: In general, Korean [t] and [k] sound should be much harder and less explosive just as in $\underline{\mathbf{C}}$ osi fan tu $\underline{\mathbf{tt}}$ e in Italian.

*[d3] = G- in George +[d3A] = ju- in judge

Jamjari Kkongkkong is a traditional Korean children's song based on nature. "Jamjari" means "dragonfly" and "kkongkkong" is an expression that describes "to freeze or stop in place." Children in South Korea used to sing this song while chasing dragonflies, with hope that a dragonfly would freeze in place to make it easier to catch.

"Kkomjari is a mixture of "jamjari" and "kkongkkong." The first syllable of "jamjari" is changed to create a rhyme.
